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Introduction

healthwatch Kingston upon Thames	Healthwatch Kingston helps people speak up about health and social care services in Kingston. They were asked to coordinate the Kingston Safeguarding Voices group (KSV).
Safe	The KSV group use their lived experience of safeguarding to make safeguarding services better in Kingston.
	This is our code of conduct policy . A code of conduct policy is a set of rules to tell staff and volunteers how they should behave when representing the KSV.
	It tells you what is OK and what is not OK.
	It helps to keep everyone safe and working well together.



Our KSV Values

	Values are the things we think are important. They help us to know how to behave and work.
Respect	Accepting people for who they are and what they believe.
Dignity	Dignity means valuing someone and treating them with respect.
Honesty	Be honest and treat everyone the same.
Treating people fairly	People must not be treated differently or badly because of things like disability, age, race or religion.
Supportive	Be supportive of each other's experiences.
Confidential	What people share with us is not to be shared outside the group without that person's permission and should always be anonymised.
Collaborative	We work together as one and cannot sort individual problems.



The law

You must follow any laws that affect your KSV work.
You must always be honest when attending KSV.
If you see someone breaking the law, you must tell the KSV coordinator.



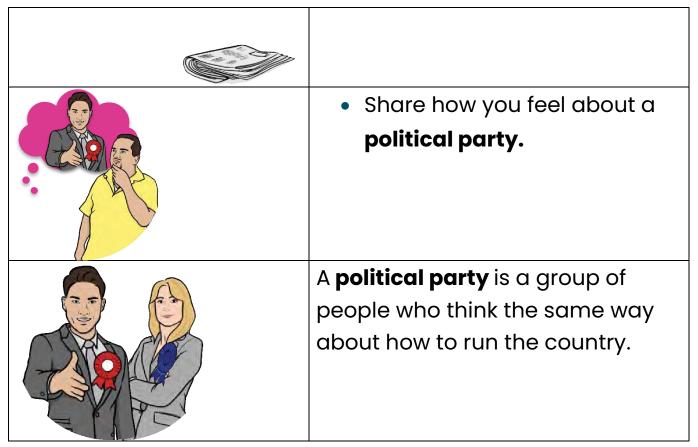
Conflict of interest

A Conflict of interest is when you or someone you know is involved in something that could affect your work with the KSV and Healthwatch Kingston.
For example, you may know someone who: • works for a company that provides services to local people • gives us our funding. Funding is the money given to run
our group. It is OK to have a conflict of interest, but you must tell us.

Going to a meeting

When you go to a meeting you must: • Do your best to arrive on time.
Be ready for the meeting.
Let the KSV coordinator know if you cannot make a meeting.
 Give everyone a chance to speak at our KSV meetings. Listen to others and do not talk when someone else is talking.
Put your hand up if you want to speak and please be patient.

You must always get someone to agree before you share their information.

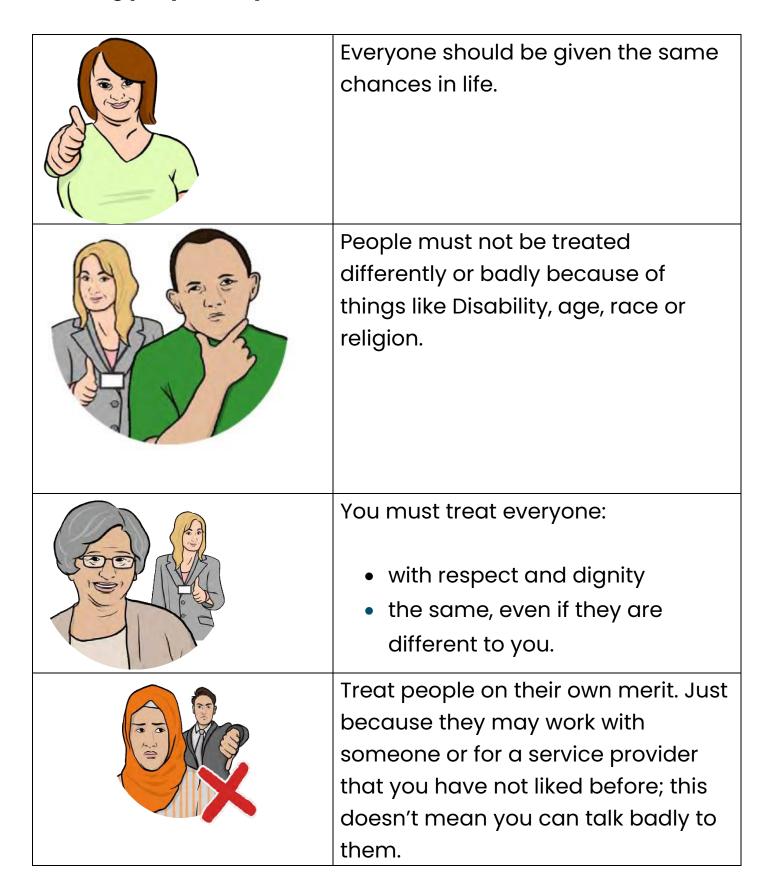


Raising a safeguarding concern

KSV meetings might include people sharing real stories about things which have happened in the past or are happening now.
These stories might make some people worried that someone is not safe.
If people are worried about what was said they might raise a safeguarding alert to the Kingston adult safeguarding team. The safeguarding team can decide if that person needs help.
This means sharing information outside of the meeting, but it is only shared with the safeguarding team and they will decide what happens next. They might decide that the person needs some help or they might decide the person does not need



Treating people fairly

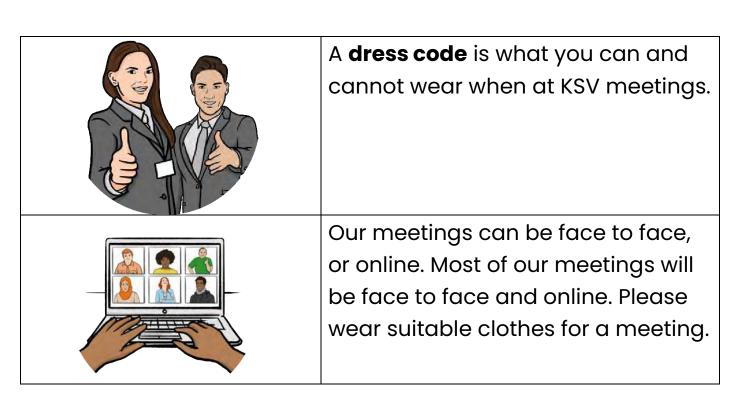




Gifts
