About the All Age Learning Disability Partnership Board



<u>All Age Learning Disability Partnership Board</u> is made up of professionals, service providers, people with learning disabilities, and their carers and advocates.



It was set up by Kingston Council, and it is supported by <u>Healthwatch Kingston</u>. It was promised in the <u>All Age Learning</u>
<u>Disability Strategy</u> and one of the key roles is to make sure the All Age Learning Disability Strategy is happening.



The Board is co-chaired by Healthwatch Kingston and local people with learning disabilities. We all work together to improve services for people with learning disabilities.



Our Aims



- 1. We want good information and support to make choices and get the right services.
- 2. We want information to be available to everyone. This includes people who don't go online or use technology.
- 3. We want information to be available in a format that supports everyone.
- 4. We want it to be easier for organisations to signpost and promote each other's services and events.



Our Aims



- 5. We want people with learning disabilities to be supported.
- 6. We want people with learning disabilities to have good access to health and social care.
- 7. We want mental health services that work for people with learning disabilities.
- 8. We want to amplify the voices of people with learning disabilities in our work.



All Age Learning Disability Strategy

The Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames, local health services, and voluntary sector organisations worked together to create a five-year plan called the <u>All Age Learning Disability Strategy</u>.



The strategy ran from 2018 – 2022, and is for children, young people, adults with learning disabilities, and their families. It explains how services in Kingston will support people to live good lives.

The strategy was written together with people who have learning disabilities, their families, health and social care staff, and community organisations. This is called co-production.



All Age Learning Disability Strategy



The strategy shared a clear vision and sets out goals and actions to:

- Give people more choice and control over their lives
- Improve health, independence, and well-being
- Reduce stigma and discrimination

The strategy is based on the <u>Social Model of Disability</u>, which focuses on removing barriers and putting people at the centre of their care and support. The strategy is currently being refreshed.



All Age Learning Disability Strategy



Work on updating the strategy has begun:

The <u>All Age Learning Disability Partnership Board</u>, chaired and coordinated by <u>Healthwatch Kingston</u> is now working with <u>Kingston Council</u> to refresh the All Age Learning Disability Strategy. This includes looking at the findings from the recent Learning Disability Needs Assessment.

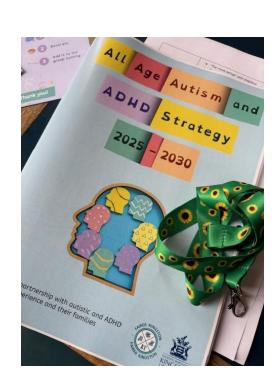

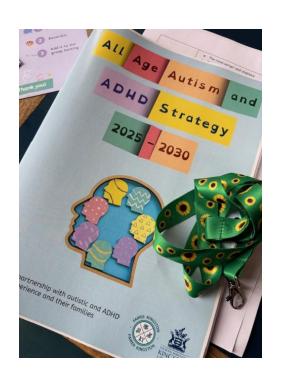


Kingston Council is committed to making life better for people with learning disabilities, autism, and ADHD. The council is working hard to bring positive changes and make sure services are good and easy to use for everyone.

Autism and ADHD Strategy:

Kingston Council launched a new <u>Autism and ADHD Strategy</u>. This plan is about supporting people of all ages who are autistic or have ADHD. The council wants to understand what people need and help them live happy, healthy lives. You can read more about the plan on the <u>Kingston Council website</u>.





Get Involved – Have Your Say:

There is a new webpage called <u>'Get involved and have your say'</u>. This page helps people share their views and ideas about adult social care. The All Age Learning Disability Partnership Board is part of this. Easy Read and non-digital versions of this information will be available soon to help everyone take part.

Kingston Disability Network:

The <u>Kingston Disability Network</u> is a group that supports people with all kinds of disabilities across the borough. It helps people connect, share information, and work together to improve local services. The network also raises awareness about the challenges Disabled people face and promotes inclusion in the community. The council works closely with the Kingston Disability Network to make sure people's voices are heard and their needs are met.





Sunflower Scheme:

The <u>Sunflower Scheme</u> is now in its second year in Kingston. It helps people with hidden disabilities, like autism or ADHD, by giving them a special sunflower lanyard. This lets others know they might need extra support or understanding.



Active 4 All Network:

The <u>Active 4 All Network</u> is another important group that helps Disabled people take part in sports and activities. It's a great way to meet others and stay active.

Kingston Council continues to listen to the community and work together to make sure everyone can live their best life.

We continue to speak to, and work with, people with learning disabilities, ensuring that health and social care providers understand the barriers faced by people with learning disabilities and their families and carers.

Healthwatch Kingston co-chairs and organises the <u>All Age Learning</u> <u>Disability Partnership Board</u> meetings. These meetings give lots of time for people with learning disabilities to talk about what is important to them.

The Involve team from Kingston Council help us with the meetings.





Supporting the Autism and ADHD Strategy

We have been involved in shaping Kingston's new five-year strategy to improve support for autistic people and those with ADHD. This strategy was co-produced with over 240 local residents, including autistic people, people with ADHD, and their supporters. Healthwatch Kingston played a role in gathering feedback and ensuring that the voices of people with learning disabilities were heard in the development of this strategy. We have set up our new group <u>Kingston Safeguarding Voices</u> which gives the public a voice in how safeguarding works in Kingston. The group is for any member of the public who has experience of the safeguarding service or supports someone who has needed support, as well as professionals.

Including Communities and Including Digitally Excluded Reports

We published our <u>Including Communities</u> and <u>Including Digitally</u> <u>Excluded</u> reports, and we returned to the groups who had supported our engagement, this included <u>Kingston Eco-op</u>.

We shared our Easy Read versions of both reports and asked what questions we could ask during our engagement to understand the <u>health and care needs of socially isolated, physically Disabled adults.</u>



Addressing Social Isolation for Physically Disabled Adults



We worked with the <u>Kingston Centre for Independent Living</u> to hold four community workshops. These workshops helped us learn about the health and care needs of physically Disabled adults who feel lonely or left out.

People with learning disabilities also took part in these workshops. We know that some people have more than one disability, and this was important to understand.

During the workshops, we found some problems that stop people joining in community life. These include buses and trains that are hard to use, not enough information about services, and people feeling judged or treated unfairly. Our work showed how important it is to create places and activities where everyone feels welcome and can make friends. You can read our final report here.



Change NHS: What Adults with Support Needs Told Us



We visited Kingston Eco-op 3 times to engage on the 3 big changes proposed in the NHS' ten-year plan. People understood the need to reduce pressure on hospitals and GPs but wanted a choice between being in a hospital or a virtual ward and preferred seeing their GP face-to-face.

The group liked having some services move away from the hospital. They remember vaccines in the community working well for them. They also said they would prefer practical support to make healthy choices such as help preparing meals.





What is next

Healthwatch have engaged with members from <u>The Larch</u> group and <u>Involve</u> to record their thoughts on grief and bereavement for adults with autism and ADHD. The recordings will be published later in 2025.



YOL! (Youth Out Loud!) is a group of young people from Kingston and Richmond who are supported by Healthwatch Kingston. They use their voices to make health and care services better for young people. Some of YOL!s work involves young Disabled people and their families. Later in 2025, YOL! Is making about young people with learning disabilities and grief.



What is next



YOL! and Healthwatch Kingston will work together to create a short information film on grief and bereavement from the perspective of young people living with a learning disability. The new project will accompany the Youth Out Loud! 2024 film that is already published on grief and bereavement. You can watch the first short film here.



Kingston Safeguarding Voices will create an Easy Read version of the Kingston Safeguarding Adults Board annual report. Kingston Safeguarding Adults Board is a group of professionals like the NHS, Kingston Council, the police, hospital, fire service, Healthwatch Kingston and more who work together to make sure services are doing what they can to keep people safe in Kingston. Every year they write an annual report so the public can see what the Board has done. This year we will turn it into Easy Read so more people can read it.

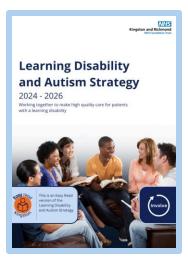


Learning Disability Liaison Team at Kingston and Richmond Hospital

The learning disability liaison team was set up in January 2021 and has had over 1000 referrals since then. In 2024 we had 289 referrals! More information can be found here.

Kingston Hospital has merged with Richmond Community Healthcare Trust. This is now called Kingston and Richmond NHS Foundation Trust. This is so we can work closely with the community.





Learning Disability Liaison Team at the hospital

In 2024 we made our Learning Disability and Autism strategy. The <u>Involve Kingston</u> team have made an Easy Read version of this.



We have set up a joint Learning Disability and Autism Steering Group with the team at <u>Your Healthcare</u>.

The Carers clinical liaison was set up and has had over 800 referrals. This helps support carers of people while in hospital and at home.



Projects in the hospital:

We have worked on lots of projects including:



Sage and Thyme:

One staff member has completed the Sage and Thyme facilitator training to teach staff skills for talking to worried or distressed people.

Improving end of life care:

There is now a case study used for Palliative care training involving a person with a learning disability.

Reasonable adjustments:

We are working with the Patient experience team to look at how reasonable adjustments are recorded. The new flag to tell staff of the need for adjustments should be working by 2025.







Projects in the hospital

We have worked on lots of projects including:

Transition:

We have a new Transition support worker in the hospital who works with people aged 11-25, this is a one-year trial.



Oliver McGowan Mandatory training:

86% of staff have done the E-learning we are still rolling out the face-to-face training.



Easy Read information:

We have worked with Involve Kingston to make Easy Read leaflets which are on our website for staff to use.

LeDeR is the name given to the work that reviews the lives and deaths of people with a learning disability and autistic people. The reviewer finds out about their care and why they died.



LeDeR has found that people with a learning disability and autistic people do not always get good healthcare.



People with a learning disability and autistic people sometimes die younger than other people from illnesses that they could have got better from.





Last year, in Kingston, the LeDeR Team had 12 notifications of people with a learning disability and autism who had died.



In Kingston we have reviewed 8 deaths, 7 people had an annual health check which helps make sure any signs of illnesses like cancer and diabetes, or breathing and heart issues are spotted early



All deaths are discussed with local partners to plan how to make services better for people with a learning disability and autism.





The LeDeR Team in Southwest London helps health and care staff learn more about how to:



 Support people with a learning disability and autistic people to be healthy and well



 Stop people with a learning disability and autistic people from dying too young

We support people with disabilities who live in the borough of Kingston.

Our job is to help people speak up and have their say about things that are happening in their local area.



We help people feel more confident to talk about things like:

- Finding a job
- Staying safe
- Getting involved in the community





We also give people a chance to make friends and feel less alone. Because we have similar life experiences, we understand the people we work with.

We use what we know to share ideas, give support, and speak up together.

Involve is here to connect the community and the council, so that everyone's voice can be heard.





What the Involve Team Did This Year (2024–2025)

Working with South Western Railway:



We created an Easy Read leaflet for South Western Railway. It helps staff on trains and at stations understand how to support people with learning disabilities and autism. We also took part in stakeholder meetings with South Western Railway to learn about the work they are doing and their future plans.

Helping Shape Local Services:

We shared our views to help shape the Autism and ADHD strategy. We also visited Hillcroft College in Surbiton and Richmond to learn about the courses they offer for people with learning disabilities and autism.



What the Involve Team Did This Year (2024–2025)



Community Involvement:

We attend the Kingston disability Network to speak up about what is happening in the community for people with additional needs. We also gave a presentation at the Larch Club, to tell people with autism about the work we do at Involve Kingston.
