5a. Support Youth Out Loud! (YOL!) to review health and care services (in partnership with other stakeholders).	Support young people to have a say in their health and care services	YOL! are meeting with RBK to discuss current prevention/early support for mental health and what YOL! know about and think of advocacy. YOL! are deciding what they would like to ask students at Kingston College freshers fair (September 2023). Last year we completed the Including Communities Survey as well as asking what students do for their mental health. SBa and HJW met with Matthew Angell, Youth Service Manager from Kingston Achieving for Children (AfC). We agreed that YOL! will attend the various youth groups across the borough to engage with young people (question set TBC) and recruit volunteers to YOL! Matthew also advised that solvent abuse in young people is on the rise, and this is of particular concern. He shared social media on solvent abuse that we will promote through our social media channels and add to YOLweb.
5b. Support delivery (with other partners) of the Digital Youth Project to add to the series of short health and care films and podcasts by young people for young people.	Develop a library of health and care films and podcasts made by young people for young people	YOL! were invited to attend the Kingston Hospital Foundation Trust Patient Experience Committee meeting to present on how and why the YOL! Sexual Health film came about, and to show them the film itself. They were all very impressed and will share it via their networks. YOL! continued discussions on topics for the fourth film in the Digital Youth Project. Vaping was discussed as an option, but young people already receive an overwhelming amount of information on vaping and our YOL! members were not very interested in this as a subject! HW Kingston was successful in winning a £5k grant application from the RBK Community Resilience Fund. Following the recent Bereavement Services and Support in Kingston - community engagement report by Healthwatch Kingston and Kingston Voluntary Action, this report identified a need for bereavement engagement with young people. HW Kingston was awarded this 'small projects' funding to maintain and develop Healthwatch Kingston's Youth Out



		Loud! 'Digital Youth Project'. This project will work with the Kingston Bereavement Think Tank and a film peer educator to support YOL! members to discuss and create a short film by young people that provides bereavement support and guidance to other young people.

London Safeguarding Adults Board, London Safeguarding Voices and Conference Planning Groups to ensure people with lived experience of safeguarding are integral to safeguarding systems and processes across London.	experience of safeguarding are part of the Kingston and London Safeguarding Adults Boards	 The London Safeguarding Voices (LSV) group is chaired by SB and co-ordinated by HJW. The LSV members are now meeting twice a month to share lived experiences of safeguarding and to participate in the planning of the LSAB Annual Conference. Following the success of the LSV group, the LSAB and LondonADASS have committed to increasing funding from two days a week to three days a week for the LSV contract period of April 2023 - March 2024. In April, one member of the LSV was involved in the interview panel for the replacement of Joanne Starkie for the LondonADASS Programme Manager role. The LSV was asked by Joanne Starkie (in her new role as CQC Assurance Programme Lead for London borough of Barking and Dagenham), for our insights into what is working well with safeguarding processes across London and what needs to be improved, and our feedback on CQC methodology when it comes to local authority assessments. The insights presented at the last LSAB Conference are still the case, i.e. Joined up services are not working. Language barriers are a barrier in raising a concern and going through safeguarding processes. Trust issues with those in authority (are a barrier for raising concerns). A better understanding of safeguarding is needed for all. Prevention and early intervention are needed.
		 Further insights: More work is needed to raise awareness and understanding of safeguarding overall and self-neglect specifically amongst health professionals, including GPs.



 People with lived experience should be involved in delivering safeguarding training and the training should be co-produced. Residents need clear, accessible information on what safeguarding is and where to go with a concern. Not all SAB annual reports are easy to find. The LSV has made a request for each SAB to check they have published the latest one and that it is easy to find. It is important to share information between agencies to safeguard adults, but there needs to be an awareness of any risks associated with this so that these can be managed. Someone being involved in a safeguarding concern/enquiry should not have this later 'used against them.'
Feedback on CQC methodology when it comes to local authority assessments:
 It is important that the CQC speak to people with lived experience, and important that they do not speak to the 'usual suspects' or solely people suggested by the local authority (there is a risk that local authorities might suggest those likely to give a positive but not representative view). CQC need to carefully think about timings in relation to speaking to people with lived experience: People need time and support to prepare to give meaningful feedback. If the local authorities are only given a couple of weeks' notice of an assessment, it will be difficult to get meaningful feedback from people with lived experience. Can the CQC introduce a mechanism for people to contact them directly to say if they are interested in giving feedback on their local authority in the event of inspection? Queries and concerns about the ability of CQC to act if there is whistleblowing (an example was given of someone in the group contacting the CQC and not hearing back from them). Will they follow complaints made to a local authority and escalated to them to review how well that bit of the process works?



	 Need to learn from current discussions about Ofsted inspections following the death of Ruth Perry. The LSV members insights and views will be shared with the London SAB Managers Network and with LondonADASS. London Safeguarding Adults Board Conference Planning LSAB Planning Team meetings resumed in April, to begin work on this year's annual LSAB Conference in November. These meetings are chaired by SB and are currently fortnightly and attended by a variety of people across different safeguarding networks in London, including Claire Solley, Chair of the LSAB.
