Kingston Care Governance Board (formally known as JIG) - have a collective responsibility to oversee and manage overall quality and risk across the whole care provider market in Kingston. We continue to attend the Board, as there is vital information shared on how local issues are being considered and addressed. The meetings are chaired by Kingston Adult Social Care, with the CQC in attendance and SB or CD represent HW Kingston. It is via this group that HW Kingston have been approached by RBQ Quality Assurance, to consider Enter and Views at local care homes, early conversation about the consideration of this project will be discussed with the Board, in line with our decision make policy.	
		Kingston and Richmond Children and Young Peoples Mental Health and Wellbeing Group - has reformed after nearly a year and will be holding monthly meetings for the next few months. The aim of the group is to provide strategic direction for children's emotional well-being and mental health in Kingston & Richmond up to age 25, including oversight of the Local Transformation Plan. This will include having an oversight of the children and young people's	



mental health priorities and impact of mental health investment. CD or KC will be attending future meetings and will update on activity.

Census Data Training - CD attended the training, provided by Superhighways to help inform our project and reporting.

2. Health inequalities

2a. Continue to monitor health inequalities, in particular the health and care needs of women, neurodiverse people and people with long term medical conditions.

Provide independent scrutiny that supports improved experience of health inequalities and the health and care needs of women and people with long term medical conditions

Kingston Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) - We have been informed that the Kingston JSNA has been finalised, but not published. Once we have sight of the publication, we can follow up on HWK's impact and how our work and recommendations have informed the RBK report. We have received praise from RBK for our support of this project.

RBK's Cost of Living Survey - HW Kingston have been asked by RBK to review a draft Cost of Living Survey. RBK have adopted the same approach as their resident survey shared in 2020 about lockdown, and are looking for ways to support local residents with a potentially challenging winter. The draft has been shared with the Board and HW Kingston staff team, and all feedback has been collated and shared with RBK. The finalised survey will be shared via the HW Kingston usual channels.

Kingston Carers Board - Since the publication of the <u>All Age Kingston Carers Strategy 2022</u> - <u>2027 | Healthwatch Kingston</u>, HW Kingston have been working with the Board on the Kingston Carers Strategy Plan. At the September meeting, there was a focus on young carers, health and wellbeing and life outside of caring.



Healthwatch England Leadership Conference - On the 20 September SB and CD attended the conference at the Congress Centre in central London. Chief Executive of Healthwatch England, Louise Ansari, opened the conference giving an overview of priority areas and more. Sessions included: The National Debate - Improving accesses to service, local Influence and HW next steps. A range of issues were discussed, including GP's, pharmacy, dentistry, and future funding. 3. Learning Disabilities

Ensure HW Kingston is "Learning Disability friendly"

<u>Kingston Eco-op</u>, support adults who have learning disabilities, mental health problems or other challenges in their lives, by offering a range of developmental activities, took part in our research for the HW Kingston Including Digitally Excluded project.

We spoke to 16 individuals who gave feedback on why they are digitally excluded and what are their barriers to giving feedback to Healthwatch Kingston and Care Quality Commission. We also asked how they would like us to communicate with them in the future, and the best way to sharer feedback and findings from the projects they have supported. The first draft for 'Including Digitally Excluded Communities' will be written in October.

Provide independent facilitation for community scrutiny of progress against All Age Learning Disability strategy priorities HWK continue to hear from members of the Partnership Board about experiences of care for people with learning disabilities, and recording them to help HW Kingston build up a wider picture of what health and social care looks like for people with a learning disability.

We received good feedback about Ditton Road Care Home (who care for people with PMLD) and Kingston Mencap, supporting a life enhancing friendship that developed between a verbal and a nonverbal service user.

Members of the board are keen to hear from RBK about housing and social prescribing, this will be timetabled next month.

The All Age Learning Disability Strategy period has ended but the AALDPB has will continue to hold the system to account against the strategy. The AALDPB will revisit the strategy at our next meeting, and agree priorities.

Provide independent facilitation for community scrutiny of progress against mental health priorities **Kingston Mental Health and Wellbeing Group -** The group continues to meet regularly with a busy agenda. Notable items from the September meeting included:

• Transitions (revived against JSNA recommendation 18. Review the awareness by stakeholders of the current CAMHS transition process and monitor how well it is being adhered to, and as part of the Mental Health Community Transformation Plan review the existing policy)



		 Right Care, Right Person' - changes to the way the emergency services respond to calls involving concerns about mental health - Iain Parkinson, SWBCU MH Partnership officer (Met Police). Update from Kingston Adult MH Partnership Task and Finish Group - The group has agreed to a project closure and operational handover, now that the new services as part of the Mental Health transformation have been established. The group agreed the collaborative meetings were useful and SB has requested a formal write up to provide an overview of the groups work over the last year. Kingston and Richmond Children and Young Peoples Mental Health and Wellbeing Group (SWL NHS) - Staff attended the relaunch and HW Kingston mental health leads will continue to attend and participate in shaping the groups direction. Governance and placement (who the group feeds into) needs to be established. See section 1.

4b. Provide independent evaluation of the south west London Community Mental Health Transformation Programme in Kingston.	Provide independent evaluation of the South West London Community Mental Health Transformation Programme in Kingston.	HW Kingston Independent Evaluation of Community Mental Health Transformation. SWLSTG commissioned local Healthwatch to gather experiences of their service users in order to make improvements on their services. The process is to be carried out across three phases. The first phase (survey of service users) had been completed. A sample of 400 recent service users was randomly selected by SWLSTG Trust. The survey was distributed via post, email, text and phone calls. The response rate was low despite additional efforts to gain feedback. The low response rate was reflective of the experiences of gathering feedback for the same evaluation carried out by Richmond and Sutton Healthwatch.



Phase one data demonstrates that satisfaction levels for waiting times for support needs to improve, with a quarter of people responding as dissatisfied.

Insights:

• 38% of respondents said they have received the help they needed, however there is still 27% of responses that felt they have not been supported well enough by the service.

Phase two of the survey will provide data to see if there is any improvements in service user experiences.

Support young people to have a say in their health and care services

Healthwatch Kingston were approached to arrange a meeting with Youth Out Loud! and Kingston Council Officers to discuss their opinions on advocacy and mental health services in the borough. YOL! feedback that they were not aware of advocacy services or what they provided. They suggested more publicity to explain advocacy services to young people.

YOL! felt more targeted information is needed for young people about what mental health support is available. They suggested a video might be useful about what to expect from mental health services for young people transitioning into adulthood.

They also liked <u>Kooth</u> (an online mental health wellbeing community for young people, which is free and provides safe and anonymous support). YOL! particularly liked that there was no waiting list, and it was free.



		Attendance at Kingston Fresher's Fair: YOL! reviewed and suggested amends to the survey used at this year's Freshers Fair, this included a question that asked how young people might want to engage (or volunteer) with HWK and YOL! The initial feedback from Kingston College students suggested that young people who identified as IT literate, they wanted to be engaged face to face as well as via online. We asked the young people at the Freshers Fair to provide their preferences for engagement. The results from this exercise are below: 1st - events such as Freshers Fair and youth clubs 67% 2nd - Social Media posts 47% (one comment was that young people ignore these) 2nd - Workshops in classrooms 47% 4th - Being in the settings (GP/Pharmacy) 30% (Author Sba)

Ensure the voices of people with lived experience of safeguarding are part of the Kingston and London Safeguarding Adults Boards	London Safeguarding Voices The London Safeguarding Voices (LSV) group is chaired by SB and co-ordinated by HJW. The LSV members are now meeting twice a month to share lived experiences of safeguarding and to participate in the planning of the LSAB Annual Conference. Recruitment of new LSV volunteers remains a key focus of the group and we continue to attend local SAB meetings and London Network SAB Manager meetings to promote recruitment. HJW and an LSV member presented an update of what the LSV has been up to and how to engage meaningfully with people with lived experience of safeguarding, at the Royal Greenwich Safeguarding Adults Board (RGSAB) quarterly meeting on Thursday 14 th September. Michael Preston-Shoot (Chair of the RGSAB) is very impressed with the work of the LSV and has committed to finding new members from the borough of Greenwich using RGSAB budgets to fund their attendance/commitment. The LSV have a recruitment presentation which we take to local SABs and VCSEs etc, but we felt that something simpler and tangible that we could provide to all local SABs and Local Authorities would be a great addition to our LSV recruitment toolkit. Therefore, the LSV have produced a two-sided flyer - 'Join the LSV' that has been emailed to all local SAB Chairs and Managers for them to disseminate to their networks. The flyer can be downloaded from the HW Kingston website, printed locally and given out at face-to-face meetings or emailed to residents who have been through the safeguarding adults process.



HJW also met with the Board Manager from Newham SAB for recruitment purposes and to provide support for their Conference Safeguarding Hub, which they are doing on the LSAB Conference Day in November for the first time this year.

London Safeguarding Adults Board Conference Planning

LSAB Planning Team meetings continued fortnightly. These meetings are chaired by SB and attended by a variety of people across different safeguarding networks in London, including Claire Solley, Chair of the LSAB and Jane Simmons from London ADASS.

After suggested safeguarding topics from the London SAB Chairs and Managers, and the LSV, the LSAB Conference Planning Team progressed work on the LSAB Conference Programme of events. As in previous years the LSAB Conference, will be held within Safeguarding Adults Week (Monday 20th - Friday 24th November 2023) and will be virtual via Microsoft Teams.

This year's LSAB Conference Programme of Events includes the main half day Conference on Wednesday 22nd November 10am - 1pm, plus lunch-time sessions, with different safeguarding topics, on other days in the week from 12 - 1.30pm. All sessions are to include the voice of people with lived experience of safeguarding.

As there will be residents at Conference Safeguarding Hubs in Islington, Newham and Barnet, we need to ensure the Conference agenda is meaningful/sensitive to this. It also an opportunity to obtain the views of local residents.
